He designed several unique scholarship programs to achieve the Foundation's mission of helping high-achieving students who have financial need reach their full potential through education. The Young Scholars Program each year identifies 35 - 50 exceptional young people in the 7th grade, assigns a personal counselor to each of them during the 8th grade and develops and funds a learning plan for high school in preparation for enrollment in a highly selective college. Successful Young Scholars may continue on to college and graduate school with a potential for Foundation support through the three programs of more than \$200,000

A Community College Transfer Program identifies similarly qualified students and awards them scholarships to transfer to a senior institution with eligibility for graduate support. At any one time, the Foundation has approximately 600 students receiving aid through its three programs and has awarded over \$100 million in its first 9 years.. The Foundation also provides significant grants to organizations whose mission and programs align with its own.

As EPA Administrator, she promoted common-sense environmental improvements such as watershed-based water protection policies, among other achievements. Gov. Whitman is now the president of The Whitman Strategy Group, a consulting firm that specializes in environmental and energy issues.

She sits on the Governing Board of the Park City Center for Public Policy, is co-chair of Clean and Safe Energy, and is co-chair of the Republican Leadership Council, which she founded.
